



TOGETHER, WE ARE BUILDING A SAFER AND BRIGHTER FUTURE FOR TANZANIAN STUDENTS.

STUDENT SAFETY

This year, Project Zawadi reached 16 communities with training and support for community leaders, teachers, and students, building awareness and practical skills to protect children. Many students now report feeling more confident advocating for themselves. In each community, we are identifying and training Community Champions — trusted local ambassadors who can respond to concerns, prevent abuse, and support children in need. Once again, **Together Women Rise** and the **Weyerhaeuser Family Foundation** made much of this work possible.

RAPID RESPONSE

Iddy is a determined young student whose dreams were interrupted when he broke his leg in two places. With limited medical options in his rural community, recovery stalled completely. His situation is exactly why we created the **Rapid Response Initiative** — the name we've now given to the urgent, unbudgeted support we've always provided when a student's education is at risk.

Because of your generosity, Project Zawadi relocated Iddy's family so he could receive a year of hospital care. Today, he walks with a crutch, and a final surgery in January is expected to help him walk fully again.

"I thought my son had given up on life. Now he wants to live again — because of you." — Iddy's mother Iddy's case exemplifies this work. Often, modest interventions make life-changing differences. Without donor generosity, this rapid, critical work would not be possible.

ALUMNI GIVE BACK

Former Project Zawadi students are now giving back. This year, an alumni group donated food to Salamakati Primary School and planted over 300 trees on campus with their own hands — a living symbol of the cycle of generosity your support creates. Your generosity is planting seeds — in classrooms, in communities, and in the hearts of students who will one day give back themselves.



INVESTING IN TEACHERS, IMPACTING A NATION

NATIONAL IMPACT

This year, we completed eight high-quality training videos in collaboration with the Tanzania Institute of Education. These videos feature Tanzanian teachers modeling proven strategies to improve learning outcomes. Approved by the national government, they will be hosted on its Learning Management System, giving **200,000 primary school teachers** across the country free access.

We are on track to produce **40 videos** — one for every grade and subject — so teachers nationwide have practical, visual guidance for better teaching. In addition, we are building a national bank of lesson plans that integrate Tenda strategies, helping teachers bring these methods to life in their classrooms.

LOCAL IMPACT

On the ground, we've been working closely with **46 schools and 439 teachers**. We provide workshops, classroom observation, one-on-one feedback, and targeted resources. Teachers are increasingly adopting Tenda strategies, and we've seen inspiring improvements in student engagement and understanding.

After nearly six years in our first wave of 17 schools, we are concluding that phase — and expanding into **13 new schools**. It's both a celebration of long-term progress and an exciting new beginning.

PROVEN SUCCESS, POISED FOR GREATER IMPACT

Over the past six years, the Model Schools Program has worked closely with four primary schools, providing teacher housing, classrooms, toilets, desks, water systems, agricultural support for the school meals program, tree planting, and student clubs. We've also built the skills of school and community leaders to improve planning, teacher development, and the creation of safe and supportive learning environments.

This year, we're proud to share not just one year of progress, but the cumulative results of a remarkable six-year journey of transformation. The numbers—shown in detail on the facing page—are a powerful reminder of how deeply this program has improved students' ability to focus and learn. This year's unusually dry season underscored the lasting value of our work: water systems we installed years ago are still providing essential access to clean water for local communities.

With our work in these four schools now complete, we're expanding into 13 new ones — applying lessons learned to achieve even greater impact at a lower cost. Our new four-step approach will:

- **1. Begin with leadership development** strengthening skills in project planning, community engagement, and school management.
- Enhance school agriculture programs to ensure sustainable support for student meals.

- Implement the Tenda Teachers Professional Development Program — raising the quality of teaching across classrooms
- **4. Provide infrastructure support** as an incentive for strong performance.

We're seeking sponsors to help transform the next 13 schools in our expansion. A sponsorship of \$10,000 per year for six years provides not just buildings and resources, but the chance for thousands of children to learn in safe, well-equipped classrooms, enjoy daily meals, and be taught by supported, inspired teachers. Each sponsor will receive naming rights recognition at their school, creating a lasting connection to the community they've helped strengthen.

For those unable to commit at that level, there are opportunities to fund specific projects — from water systems to agricultural programs — over the same six-year journey.

Already, eight schools have been sponsored thanks to the generosity of: Rhonda Barona & Expanding Horizons, Joe & Amy Cass, Michael & Clare Kerins, Malcolm & Mary Morris, Diane & Gary Rumsey, and a memorial gift honoring Lynne Wadlinger Stryker.

This model doesn't just improve schools — it equips leaders, builds resilience, and creates change that will endure long after the project ends.


PROJECT ZAWADI ENDED THE FISCAL YEAR IN A STRONG FINANCIAL POSITION, WITH TOTAL INCOME OF \$671,647 AND EXPENSES OF \$667,313, RESULTING IN A MODEST SURPLUS OF \$4,334. EVEN WITH A SMALL DECREASE IN INCOME COMPARED TO THE PRIOR YEAR, CAREFUL MANAGEMENT OF EXPENSES ENSURED THAT PROGRAMS REMAINED WELL-FUNDED AND SUSTAINABLE. ONCE AGAIN, MORE THAN 93% OF ALL EXPENSES WENT DIRECTLY TO PROGRAMS, DEMONSTRATING OUR CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO EFFICIENCY AND IMPACT. WE ARE PROUD TO HAVE MAINTAINED OUR 100% FOUR-STAR RATING FROM CHARITY NAVIGATOR AND EARNED THE 2025 PLATINUM TRANSPARENCY RATING FROM CANDID, THE HIGHEST POSSIBLE RECOGNITION FOR ACCOUNTABILITY AND OPENNESS. WE ARE DEEPLY GRATEFUL FOR THE GENEROUS SUPPORT OF FOUNDATIONS, CORPORATIONS, AND INDIVIDUAL DONORS WHO MAKE THIS WORK POSSIBLE.


Legacy to me means the future. It's wonderful to know that 20 years from now, students I've never met will be able to go to school and learn through Project Zawadi.
